## **A Reflection**

The account of the feeding of the five thousand as told in in Matthew has been an inspiration to Christians in many diverse situations. It occurs immediately after Jesus and the disciples hear of the brutal murder of John the Baptist and after a long day with large and desperate crowds. The disciples understandably were seeking to get away. They were grief stricken and in similar circumstances as we probably would --- they tell the crowds to go away. We read however that Jesus had compassion and invited the crowd to sit and to eat. "But we have only barely enough for ourselves", we hear the disciples cry. As so often, they were in for a shock; surprise that all the thousands were fed with so little; amazement at the miraculous power of God's love.

This is the only miracle story found in all four gospels. It was obviously of great importance to the early church. This account of the feeding of the five thousand was treasured because it taught Christians the very heart of the gospel message and was a deep source of hope and inspiration for Christians who were seeking to be faithful against great odds.

First of all, the story teaches us, then and now, that God is love. Secondly the story teaches its hearers about the responsibilities that God entrusted to the disciples. If we look at the passage very carefully, we can see that Jesus did not himself feed the crowds, he told the disciples to do it. As disciples of Jesus, we share in these responsibilities.

The story reminds us all that when we need it most, God will give us the power to work for good in the world. When the disciples worked together and followed Jesus there was more than enough to feed everyone. When we co-operate with each other and share resources, miracles do indeed happen, at a local level as well as a national and international level. Amen
