A Reflection

The gospel reading for today could not have been more appropriate. Yes, we know it well: the parable of the sower, or as some see it, the parable of the four soils. But if we think about it today, in the middle of all we have been struggling with for the last few months, it might give rise to new thoughts and challenges.

This parable and its interpretation are sandwiched between stories of opposition to the gospel. Chapters 11 -12 contain multiple stories of opposition and misunderstanding of Jesus' ministry. Chapter 13 ends with Jesus' home-town rejecting him. The parable of the sower and four soils, in between these accounts of rejection, may be an answer to the question, why does the gospel take root and grow among some people, but not among others? The flip side of this question is, what are the necessary conditions for fruitful discipleship.

The four soils described are, hardened, shallow, thorny and good. Our churches have been closed for months and it is only very recently that they have been allowed to be open for private prayer and, under special conditions for the prevention of risk, to be considering brief services. Churches of all denominations, and indeed different faiths, are asking themselves, how do we recover from this.

Turning back to the parable, Matthew draws attention to essential conditions for the growth of discipleship, beginning with understanding. Understanding the message of Jesus doesn't always come as a revelation, although for some, miraculously it does. So, we need to understand what God's Kingdome "on earth as it is in heaven" is about. And then, Matthew continues to remind us all that we have to be prepared to deal with resistance. This comes from outside, such as people mocking those of faith. But it also comes as temptations from within; the kind of anxious cares (Matthew 6: 25 32) and the lure of wealth and materialism (Matthew 19, 16-32).

These issues are with us all the time, but are brought into sharp focus by the continuing concern we all have about physical health and the health of economies. We have a great del to reflect on in the days and weeks ahead. But I know that if we are open to the influence and guidance of the Holy Spirit, again we will find The Way.
